Vale Park Primary School children are playing their part in spreading Christmas cheer around the Australian Defence Force.

They have made packages full of toiletries, crossword books and Australian-themed snacks – including Tim Tams – for military personnel deployed overseas.

Each package carries a handwritten letter or drawing to let the recipient know the children are thinking of them. "It's nice to know that we can help to make them happy at Christmas and make sure they don't miss out," Year 5 Lucy, of Klemzig, says.

"It's important to give back to the troops and support them because they're doing such a big thing for our country."

This marks the second year the school has sent care packages.

Assistant principal Kim Dickmann says there is one item in high demand.

Mrs Dickmann says creating the packages also supplied an important insight into the lives of those on overseas deployment.
